Pingle Government College for Women, Warangal, has good Management Information System (MIS), as briefed below 1. The AADHAR based thumb recognized BioMetric Attendance System for the teaching and non teaching staff

is in practice in the college and all the members of the staff are following the BMC system sincerely. The incoming and outgoing timings are marked mechanically. 2. DOST: The State Government of Telangana, introduced Degree Online Services Telangana portal (DOST), by which the entire UG admissions in the state are being done in single counter, under the supervision of the Department of Higher Education, Telangana State. The state government issue an admission notice inviting the admissions. The process, usually begin in the month of May. The students intended to admit in UG courses in Government and Private degree colleges in the state, need to enroll through online(Meeseva) and the admissions are being done according to rules / reservations and the students can confirm the admission online. The entire process of admission is online. The DOST convenor at college level will supervise the entire process 3. Institutional Email system is in practice, by which entire communication to the higher authorities and vice versa, is in practice. The online communication through email reduced lot of time and paper. The quality and responsibility has increased due to following the online communication. The usage of paper communication is reduced. 4. The parent University, Kakatiya University, collects the examination fee and other recognition fee, etc. online, posting the nominal rolls, hall tickets, examination results and the temporary marks sheets, readmission process, etc. online. The university is planning to implement to use online question paper printing at the college level. There is sufficient infrastructure in the college. 5. All the subject departments are being provided with computers and internet facility. Seven classrooms are equipped with smart classrooms. MANA TV rooms is also available to scheduled online classes. 6. The English language lab and TSKC labs are sufficiently equipped to cater the needs of the students and staff. 7. The Library is fully automated and online services are also available. The users can log in and read the books 24/7, online. 8. The entire college campus is under the

surveillance of 24 CC cameras and good security is provided.

CRITERION I – CURRICULAR ASPECTS

1.1 – Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

The college has an inbuilt mechanism for effective delivery of curriculum with a blend of curricular, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities and believes in continuous learning and evaluation off the students. The college adopts the following procedure for the affective implementation of the curriculum through a well-planned and documented process: All the courses including U.G & P.G. courses offered by the college are in choice based credit system (CBCS) pattern. 1. The college is affiliated to Kakatiya University, Warangal. The syllabus is prescribed by the University as per the UGC guide lines. The syllabus is being following and completed as per the Almanac prescribed by the University for every semester. 2. As per the syllabus prescribed by the university each optional subject as 60 hours to 90 hours per semesters including 30 hours for practical classes in the subject where ever required. 3. In addition to the above hours for the main subjects 30 hours Ability Enhancement compulsory Courses for the first two semesters and 30 hours Generic Electives for the last two semesters are part of UG curriculum. 4. Apart from this, employability skills and life skills are being imparted through various-on-campus and off-campus training programmes by TSKC. 5. Games and sports are conducted in the college by the department of physical education for the physical and mental fitness of the students. 6. A regular time table is prepared by the time table committee at the college level. Time table is followed scrupulously to achieve the objective of affective delivery off the curriculum in each semester. 7. Department wise curricular plan in each semester is prepared and reviewed every month to see that the teaching process is going on as per the schedule. 8. Various teaching methods such as lecturer method, direct method, bi-lingual method and seminar method, group discussion, students' seminar, group presentation, practical method are used for the effective delivery of the curriculum. 9. TSAT live classes and ICT are used in all the departments. 10. The days of National and International importance are celebrated to inculcated moral and ethical values among the students to boost up a sense of patriotism, commitment and dedication. 11. Review meetings are conducted at department level as well as college level on the implementation of curricular plants. 12. Suitable plans are prepared keeping in mind the aspirations need interest and the future goal for the students through mentor mentee system. The system helps the faculty members to directly interact with the students and parents but also help them to full fill their aspirations. 13. Two internal examinations in each semester are conducted by the university and students' wise results of the examinations are recorded by all the departments. 14. The aspirations, interests and future goals of the students are observed and suitable plans are prepared to refine and fulfil the aspirations of the students through "Mentee-Mentor" method, this method helps the faculty members to directly contact not only the students but also their parents.

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2.5.2 – Reforms initiated on Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level (250 words)

The institution considers evaluation system as an important aspect of teaching-learning process. Evaluation of students' performance is done in various ways. Students are given assignments after completion of every unit. They are involved in student seminars, subject quiz, group discussions and study projects. These activities help the students to know their level of understanding of the context. Two internal examinations are conducted twice during each semester. The best of two will be considered and uploaded in the university exam branch website. 20 percent marks are allotted to internal exams and semester end exams are conducted at the end of each semester for 80 percent marks. Slow learners are identified based on the performance of the students in the examinations, class room performance, pass percentage, submission assignments and personal interaction. Remedial coaching is given to such students to improve their performance. Parents are also kept in loops the institution conducts parent teachers meet periodically to enhance the communication between parents-teachers students.

The institute adheres to the Academic Calendar prepared according to the calendar provided by CCE, Hyderabad and also every year we prepare a department wise activity schedule for smooth functioning. Teaching and Learning

The Academic Calendar from CCE and the University Almanac is communicated to the institution at the beginning of the Academic Year. The institutional plan is prepared as per CCE guidelines. Numbers of Instruction Days are pre-defined by the university. The time table schedules, academic co-curricular, extracurricular plans are prepared at the beginning of the academic year in compliance with guidelines from CCE. Departmental meetings are conducted by each Department and the action plan for each year is prepared and executed. The same is submitted to IQAC for submission of AQAR. The university decides the time tables for practical and external examinations to be conducted in that year. The evaluation blue print is set by the University. The college has an Internal Examination Committee to conduct Term Examinations in September, December and Pre-finals in February. Records of evaluation are maintained with the Committee. However, from 2016, the Institution has adopted CBCS-Semester pattern wherein internals are conducted as per University Schedule and with the Examination Branch. The Principal constitutes various committees for the smooth functioning of the college and for decentralization of admissions process. IQAC conducts

meeting every month to monitor various activities conducted by all the Departments. On 5th of every month the principal checks the syllabus completion, teaching diaries, Synopsis and Students' Attendance Registers.

Teachers are well equipped with computer skills and innovative teaching methods and deliver the lectures using ICT when required. Slip tests are conducted by the faculty after completion of each chapter. Teachers follow interactive method of teaching besides lecture method. Student centric learning is imparted to students. English Language teachers are specially trained under ELF Programme which is an initiative of CCE in collaboration with the US State Department. Institution has well established ELF lab to develop communication skills. The IQAC is the care taker of quality and sustenance in the Institution.

7.3 – Institutional Distinctiveness

As the college is affiliated Kakatiya University, and University has designed curriculum and same was adopted by the college. However, many faculty members of our college serve as Boards of Studies members in various subjects and they contribute towards curriculum development and designing and also some senior faculty are invited to prepare University examination question papers and to take part in the evaluation processes. The college prepares a curricular plan based on the guidelines by Commissioner of Collegiate Education, Government of Telangana and according to the almanac communicated by the affiliated University. The departments in turn prepare their own annual academic plan which is reviewed periodically by IQAC and Principal of the college and measures are taken to implement the same effectively. Conventional method of teaching is followed along with ICT-based teaching methods. The college has developed a student centric, interactive teaching learning process involving class room seminars, group discussion, quiz, field trips, industrial tours etc. The slow learner and backlog students are providing remedial coaching and merit

students are allotted study projects. Students' evaluation is systematically planned with continuous unit tests, quarterly, half yearly and pre-final examinations. The annual examination is conducted and evaluation is carried out by the Kakatiya University through a central spot-valuation camp. An examinations committee works towards smooth conduct of all examinations related work. The faculty not only participate in curricular, co-curricular, extracurricular, research and extension activities but also extend their cooperation in administration by coordinating various academic and administrative committees constituted by the principal. The faculty are encouraged to publish research papers and participate in National and International seminars/conference/workshops etc. The college is provided with spacious, well-furnished class rooms, UGC sponsored hostel for women, well equipped science and computer laboratories, partially automated library with e-corner and access to N-List with books and journals, a reading room, MANA TV room, UGC funded remedial coaching centre for SC and ST students, a Sports room with Gym facility, Girls waiting room, Research centre, Women Empowerment cell and NSS room and Canteen. The college has bio-metrics attendance for teaching and non-teaching staff and Wi-Fi connectivity is available on campus. Security measures have been put in place through installation of 12 CC Cameras. Students are provided value based education and are involved in extension activities through NSS, Harivillu etc. Centralized support centres such as Women empowerment Cell, Grievance Redressal Cell, Health Club, Red Ribbon Club. The college has an alumnae association which brings elite guests to the campus and provide feedback related to career oriented value additional.
