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The college organises programs for advanced learners and slow learners. The college regularly conducts orientation program for the students at the commencement of the programme for the first year students every year. It would help students to get familiarized with the institution, curricular and co-curricular and extra-curricular activities, facilities, rules and regulations etc of the institution. Students are given a training on communication skills, personality development, time management and motivational sessions. Guest Lectures are arranged for the students to help them gain industry and practical knowledge from the experts.

Advanced learners: High performing students are identified on the basis of internal assessment, semester end examination, involvement in classroom. Students are encouraged to organize technical events. Advising to participate in group discussions, quizzes to develop analytical and problem-solving abilities in them and thereby to improve their presentation skills. Various club activities are conducted by all the departments in the respective areas to mould the students in corresponding field. NPTEL session is conducted for all the subject for tough topics. Students are encouraged to take up study projects to inculcate research orientation and practical awareness. Students are also provided opportunities to develop their creativity by participating and organizing intercollegiate symposiums. Semester toppers are encouraged with certificates and cash prizes by the institution. Process to encourage bright student.

Slow learners: The Institute practices a robust student academic counselling process. During the course of study group of students are assigned to a faculty for counselling. The counsellors monitor academic performance and interact frequently to understand and assist any student with issues that affect their ability to learn or impede their academic success. The institute has a system to communicate performance and attendance of students regularly. A group of class students are assigned to a faculty as mentor and personal and academic care of the student is taken care of by the corresponding mentor. Mentors communicate regularly with the parents. Care is taken by faculty in monitoring the performance of slow learners.

3. EXAMINATION REFORMS BY THE COLLEGE

The “Examination Reforms Committee” was constituted in 2012. The committee meets regularly on need basis to discuss and resolve all the matters relating to the examination Branch in the college and take decision subject to the approval of Academic Council / Governing Body. The following reforms were initiated:

- a. The question papers of all the semesters to be audited by expert faculty to check the quality of question papers and also to check whether the question papers cater to the needs of all the students.
- b. Issuing Grade Report instead of Memorandum of Marks.

Grading System

The student’s performance in a course (paper), and the program, is calculated by the following procedure:

- (a) The answer scripts are valued and marks are awarded, as per rules. The student is deemed to have earned the allotted credits provided, she obtains minimum pass marks prescribed for that paper.
- (b) The total marks obtained (Internal + External Examination) in each course are then converted to Grade Letter (GL) as per the approved conversion table. Each GL is given a pre-determined weight called Grade Point (GP) in ascending order from F to O
- (c) Credit Points (CP) are calculated for each course (paper) by multiplying the credits earned in that paper with GP determined for that paper.
- (d) CGPA is calculated at the end of the entire program by the given formula.

- By adopting experiential learning methods, fast learners are motivated to explore their inherent and innovative talent and slow learners are provided with extra classes and study material to make them on par with other students.
- ICT based methods are adopted such as PPTs and providing e-learning resources to the students such as SWAYAM, NPTEL, MOOCs.

- By adopting innovative teaching methods such as cross over teaching where students are taken to field trips, museums and exhibitions.
- Academic collaborations through MoUs have been undertaken which facilitated the in charge of academic information and helped in conducting training programmes for students.

Evaluation system:

- Evaluation is an integral and continual process of the teaching-learning and is strictly confidential.
- A separate Examination Branch is established for continuous evaluation.
- Evaluation comprises of the Internal and External Assessment of 40% and 60% respectively.
- Transparency in the Continuous Internal Evaluation and End Semester Examinations.
- The Internal Assessment is a continuous assessment comprising of written test, seminars, assignments, and MCQs.
- Evaluation of Course Outcomes, Program Specific Outcomes, and Program Outcomes through Feedback from stakeholders used to monitor teaching quality.
- The institution has an effective mechanism for Redressal of Grievances.

Research:

- After autonomy was granted, the college laid emphasis in underpinning the research contributions of the faculty through a well-designed research policy. The college encourages the participation of faculty through financial assistance, impetus and research facilities.
- **Research Advisory Committee:** The College has initiated the charter of a Research Advisory Committee (RAC) to guide and promote research activities.
- **Research Facilities:** The College is 4G enabled with learning resources. The fully equipped Libraries provide a host of Books, journals, magazines and publications.
- **Industry Institution collaborations:** The College has forged 39 collaborations with premier industries and institutions for project work, internship, research activities
- **Research output during the last 5 years:** The increase in the number of faculty with 25 Ph.Ds, 5 M.Phil, 15 NET and 15 SET, publishing of research papers in quantity and quality, 12 UGC Minor Research Projects, 216 publications/paper presentations, 5 seminars /workshops organized attended by the faculty, funds received from following agencies: (UGC, TSCH), gratify the research promotion in the college.

The college area consists of 2.3 acres with a heritage building and a newly

constructed building consisting of 3 blocks for arts, science and commerce. There are altogether 30 classrooms, 10 laboratories, 01 library, 01 Reading Room, 01 Language laboratory, 01 Mana TV Room and 10 Staff Rooms. Internet is available in all the departments and library throughout the day. Besides these the college is privileged to have Jawahar Knowledge Centre(KC), which has one lecture hall and a computer lab with 50 thin clients connected in LAN with 2 servers.
